

Philip and the Eunuch. Acts 8:26-40

1. Philip was called from a successful meeting Samaria. Acts 8:5; 8:12; 8:26.
2. The Eunuch was a man of great authority but he needed to obey the gospel just the same as the common man. Acts 8:27.
3. The Eunuch was deeply religious. He had been to Jerusalem to worship. Acts 8:27.
4. Though a busy man the Eunuch was not too busy to go to Jerusalem.
 - (a) He was the treasurer for Queen Candace of the Ethiopians. Acts 8:27.
 - (b) Many people are so busy in secular pursuits today that they cannot "take time to be Holy."
5. He was a sincere seeker of the truth and was able to find it. Matt. 7:7,8; Jno. 7:17
6. He obeyed the gospel immediately after hearing it.
 - (a) No dallying around with him. He was "hungering and thirsting after righteousness. Matthew 5:6; John 7:37; 4:14.
7. This New Testament case of conversion is devoid of many erroneous theories for this present day:
 - (a) There was not voting on this sinner.
 - (b) No relating of a religious experience.
 - (c) No direct operation of Holy Spirit.
