  - 2. There are congregations so cold and unresponsive that the preacher's thoughts are chilled in transmission.

    - 2. Nothing can be of any real value in God's sight which does not shape itself into obedience. Not enough of itself to hear the truth and to know the truth: Obedience necessary.

      - (1) God raised him (Jesus) up the third day ... To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whoseever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins. 10:40-43

## THE CHARACTER OF CORNELIUS. Six things said of him:

1. HE WAS A DEVOUT MAN. Verse 2.

1. His merality was of a high standard, not one merely to satisfy the scanty standards of these who had a "form of godliness" but whose lives denied the power thereof.

2. His religion was a religion of devotion.
2. ONE THAT FEARED GOD WITH ALL HIS HOUSE. Verse 2
1. He took an interest in his family as well as his subordinates.

3. HE GAVE MUCH ALMS TO THE PEOPLE. Verse 2

1. His employment was to visit the sick, feed the hungry, clethe the maked, visit the fatherless and the widews. Gal. 6:10; James 1:27

2. He was a man of large-hearted liberality

1. How many Christians would be surprised and startled if the carefully asked themselves and answered the question, "WHAT PROPORTION OF MY INCOME DO I GIVE TO GOD?"

4. HE PRAYED TO GOD ALWAYS. Verse 2

1. He did not appear before the Lord empty. He sent up prayers and alms tegether.
