Before the statement, "Ye have not passed this wya heretofore," was made God said to Joshua:

- 1. "Moses my servnat is dead; (Joshua 1:2)

- 3. Though and all this people,
- 4. Unto the land which I do give to them.

God's promise to Moses renewed to Joshua:

- 1. "Every place that the soul of your feet shall tread upon...
- 2. That have I given unto you, as I said unto Moses. Joshua 1:3
 - 1. The two spies said, "The Lord hath delivered into our hands all the land. Joshua 2:24
 - 2. To Abraham the Lord said, "I will give you this land."
 - 3. Rahab said, "I know that the Lord hath given you the land." Joshua 2:9
